We continue to question if low and middle-income families can afford a college education even when considering net-price vs. sticker price. Is college truly an investment?

At Claremont McKenna College she is responsible for developing institutional policies and procedures that impact both the recruitment and enrollment management decision processes.

Georgette served as the Chair of the College Board of Trustees. The College Board is responsible for the development, implementation, and administration of the SAT and AP exams. The College Board also shapes and influences higher education financing policies. Georgette has held a number of other leadership positions in professional higher education organizations throughout her career, including the National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC) and the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators (NASFAA).
