"California Community College-A Personal Reflection, 1965-2015, And a Look at the Next 50 Years"

Nannini, has worked at the college for 28 years ever since he was hired as a general counselor in 1988. During his tenure, the Culver City resident has been assigned to several counseling divisions, including the Scholars Program, an honors transfer program. But he has made a particular mark in the past 17 years as the Transfer Center faculty leader, a role that is critical to the college.

Under his leadership, the college sponsors dozens of workshops for students on completing applications and navigating the transfer process. His office brings in four-year university recruiters to campus on an almost daily basis during the school year, conducts bus tours to universities statewide, and hosts the largest college transfer fair in the state, attracting more than 100 universities worldwide. In addition, he has helped develop transfer opportunities for SMC students with four-year institutions throughout the world, including the lvy League Columbia University in New York.

But he doesn't stop there. Nannini uses his extensive contacts statewide to personally appeal on behalf of students who have not been admitted to a particular university when he believes the student should be given another shot.

On a larger scale, he is the author of the "Nannini Guide," which provides a road map to students and counselors that details the intricacies of the UC transfer admission process. And he has become active at the statewide and national levels, serving as president of the Transfer Center Directors Association and giving presentations throughout California and the U.S.
