

**Figure 8. First-Year Institutional Average Effective Teaching Practices and Student-Faculty Interaction by Selectivity**









# **“THE BIG SIX” COLLEGE EXPERIENCES**

The Gallup-Purdue Index measured the degree to which 30,000 U. S. college graduates were engaged in their work and thriving in their purpose, social, financial, community and physical well-being. They identified six key factors of their college experiences:

- a professor who made them excited about learning
- professors who cared about them as a person
- a mentor who encouraged them to pursue their goals and dreams
- working on a long-term project
- a job or internship where they applied what they were learning
- extensive involvement in extra-curricular activities

- It takes all A's to get into a "good" college
- If I don't get into a Name Brand ("good") college, I will have no future
- A public university will cost me less than a private one

- Usually 12 – 15 colleges

# CONSIDERATIONS IN SHAPING

***The list should be shaped no later than early October,  
to give the student time to complete applications!***

- “fit” based on prioritized considerations, including those of the parents
  - location, academics, support, activities
- not necessarily the same reason for each college
  - i.e. bioengineering at one college, biology at another

# CONSIDERATIONS IN SHAPING

- student would attend each college  
or is it just for the parent?
- affordability . . . financial aid safeties  
certain bottom line price? or “we  
would like scholarships?”
- no more than 9

# CONSIDERATIONS IN SHAPING

- admissibility . . . includes at least 3 “safety” or “likely schools” and how many “reaches”?
- testing . . . what kind needed and when?  
test optional colleges?
- timing of applications  
can the student get earlies done during a busy football / volleyball season?

# CONSIDERATIONS IN SHAPING

- complications of applications  
how many types of applications?  
Private Common App,  
Public In and Out of State,  
Private Own App?
- how many essays?  
Common App, and individualized  
supplements

***Can this student get the work done and still pass classes? be a senior? get any sleep?***


